Letter from the **Executive Director**

Shaping the future of early childhood education

There's no doubt the last couple of years have been hard for children and families across the country and in our community. Your support allowed us to operate, adapt, and continue to move forward addressing the diverse and changing needs of children 0-8. We are proud of the progress that has been made and the hard work by so many in our community to serve others.

The pandemic shed light to just how critical early care and education is to working families. Many centers stayed open to serve first responders and supported those families who work outside the home. Today, as we are moving back to "normal," child care centers face even lower enrollment levels (down 60%) than before the pandemic. Simply put, the landscape has changed for early education and families.

This year, DEPC will conduct a community scan to help shape the future of early childhood programs in our community and base future efforts on this community's specific needs. DEPC will partner with community groups to host listening circles/focus groups where families can share their experiences around obtaining care for their children. We will facilitate discussions on child care choices (traditional child care, stay home with parent, family/friend/neighbor care, etc.) to better serve families in our community. Please join us to help shape this work.

Addressing Today's Child Care Crisis

North Carolina is currently facing an unprecedented workforce crisis in early childhood. Fewer people are entering the early childhood field and qualified teachers are leaving the field at high rates due to low compensation, lack of benefits and lack of recognition in the field. Did you know the average pay for a child care teacher in Nash and Edgecombe counties is around \$10 per hour... even lower than the state average of \$12.

In addition, today, only 70 percent of households include two parents, and only 3.4 percent of all North Carolina families-single-parent and two-parent—have a stay-at-home parent who cares for children full time. Working families depend on quality early care and learning teachers to help them with the healthy intellectual, social, emotional and physical development of their infants, toddlers and preschoolers. These need to be the best possible experiences for our children.

The current early education system is under strain and requires additional resources to strengthen early childhood providers and teachers and support for families of young children as they work.

A DEPC Success Story: Supporting the shifting needs of families, child care providers

In January of 2021, DEPC assessed the child care scholarship program for families and saw significant underspending related to pandemic issues To further exacerbate the issue, child care providers were overwhelmed with the health and safety demands that were increased with the "Great Resignation" making maintaining staffing requirements in the midst of a declining child care education workforce impossible.

DEPC responded by launching an initiative to retain and recruit child care teachers by tackling teacher compensation. Current child care reimbursement rates to child care providers could not support increased compensation to teachers and staff. We responded and moved to the 2018 state floor market rate. Some instances required a 30% increase to child care providers. Further, we trained child care providers on the importance of compensation at the model salary scale and asked for their commitment to begin working towards the process of paying child care teachers in parity with the local school system.

Our commitment to increased teacher compensation is essential to quality early childhood programs and we continued to pay providers at the 2018 state floor

market rate for the entire fiscal year and beyond!

Thank you to our teachers and providers who are working hard each day for our children and families. This year DEPC held an appreciation luncheon for teachers and providers. These are just some of our wonderful early educators.

2021 Game On Campaign Provides Support for DEPC

Thanks to the generous contributions from individuals, businesses, foundations and community partners DEPC exceeded its "Game On" Fundraising Campaign goal. Steve Felton served as chair of the campaign along with DEPC Board Chair Stacy Jesso.

"We cannot thank the staff, board and community enough for their hard work to make this a success," Jesso said. "Steve Felton has done a great job, not only spreading the joy and knowledge about this campaign to our community but he connected with so many people to bring funding to support this great cause."



Thanks to DEPC committees, community events, businesses and outreach efforts, the current enrollment grew to serve **3,455 children** this year. Every month a *free*, developmentally appropriate book is mailed to each child until they turn 5. Today, DPIL information can be found in restaurants, local barber shops, non-business settings, both county health departments, and local medical clinics. Faith communities have also embraced the promotion of DPIL, sharing registration information and enrollment assistance with their congregations. Events like **Party in the Park Drive Thru** and community fairs helped reach more children this year. The popular social media event "Where's **Dolly Reading**" helped raise awareness about the program and promoted various partners in the community. Visit depc.org to learn more about this program!

Faithful Families promotes healthy lifestyle

Faithful Families promotes healthy eating and physical activity in communities of faith. The program includes a 9-session healthy eating and physical activity curriculum. Faithful Families' program approach includes small group sessions and policy and environmental changes at the faith community level to promote health for individuals, families, and the local community. Success stories from participants in the 17 Faithful Families communities include:

- Improved strategies for grocery shopping. Learning to prepare a list made shopping easier.
- Healthier food options, decreasing sugary drink intake, while increasing water intake.
- Learning substitute options for meal preps that the whole family would try.
- Finding a community to share exercise and healthy eating ideas and strategies with each other.

Family Services

A single-mom with a four-year-old was referred to DEPC. She was offered a Pre-K slot for her son and had to decline because of her work hours. She called the Family First

community resources. After brainstorming solutions, mom decided to ask for her Pre-K slot back, apply for DSS (Division of Social Services)/Wrap around services and to ask a friend to pick up her son from Pre-K until she could get assistance. (Little Dilemma- The slot had been filled!) Mom called the Family First Line again and staff were able to find her another Pre-K Program. The 4-year-old has started Pre-K and mom has applied for Wrap-Around services at DSS. Mom was also referred to WIC and a local church pantry to help with the rising cost of food.



Filling a Community Need

Pastor Gary Lee participated in the 3rd Annual Faith Community Expo with 20 other faith community partners. He shared information about his church's tutoring program for all students and the recently renovated Family Resource Center. Pastor Lee also partnered with DEPC for summer learning resources and partnered with the Food Bank of Central and Eastern NC as a first-time site for Summer Feeding Summer Learning site.

Summer Feeding Sites Promote Summer Learning

Summer can be a difficult time for families to find healthy meals they can afford. It can be a time where children experience loss in learning. This year, three Summer Feeding Meal sponsors included: Nash County Public Schools (NCPS) and Edgecombe County Public

Schools (ECPS) Nutrition Program and the Food Bank of Central and Eastern NC. In addition to providing meals, targeted sites received resources for summer learning/enrichment and physical activity. **Cummins Rocky Mount Engine Plant** has been a staunch supporter of summer learning, including the Campaign for Grade-level Reading and Twin Counties Read to Rise. This year there were 15 community-based sites.

Why does attendance matter?

Each year DEPC promotes an Attendance Matters campaign. The theme for this year was "Stay in the Game." It is more difficult for children to learn to read and to gain other foundational academic skills when they miss many school days, arrive late or leave school early. Students who are chronically absent in preschool, kindergarten, and first



grade are much less likely to read at grade level by third grade and are more likely to have poor attendance in later grades.

Triple P Discussion Group Supports Parents

One family entered the program with five children, no job, and living in a homeless shelter. When the mom first started the program, her confidence seemed defeated, and she did not open up much during discussions with other parents. Every week, she would come in facing new challenges and frustrations. As the sessions continued, families and facilitators rallied around her and praised her for the ways in which she began to implement what she had learned even in the face of her challenging circumstances. She began contributing more and more to the conversation, revealing the ways in which she found success and started to see herself as a capable advocate

for her family. We worked with her at DEPC to help provide new resources to her family and to relay her efforts to the employment and housing organizations she would apply to. On the last night of class, she shared with the group the exciting news of her visit to a home she had been approved to rent through the work she had done with the Partnership and our local Housing Authority. She also started a new job that she was thrilled about and was approached by the shelter she previously lived in to come back and teach life skills courses to families once her move was complete. The room quickly became filled with excitement and celebration. Not only was she leading her family through better parenting skills, but she was also building them a better life in all capacities.


