Connecting schools and families

The Ready Schools initiative supports local elementary schools to connect resources and activities to ensure schools are prepared to meet the needs of all children and families. Connections are made to ensure a seamless transition from PreK settings into elementary schools. Focus areas of the work include school attendance, school readiness, and summer learning to support the mission of DEPC: All children are healthy, life-long learners by the end of grade three. Family and community engagement are critical to the success. An example of the work is offering hands-on learning activities to promote health and literacy. Grade 2 students at Middlesex Elementary School, supported by faith-based community groups, participated in gardening activities coupled with literacy through vocabulary and reading selections.

Playgroups expand

Kaleidoscope Play & Learn groups expanded to three sites in 2025 – Rocky Mount, Spring Hope and Tarboro!

Supporting families across generations

Shirley Freeman, a grandmother and retired educator, has long been connected to the Down East Partnership for Children (DEPC). Decades ago, she helped launch DEPC's first playgroups as a program coordinator. Today, her and her family are once again benefiting from DEPC's programs—this time as a grandparent helping raise her granddaughter.

Through DEPC's ARPA Program, her family was able to receive critical supplies, including a car seat, bed with bedding, diapers, and wipes. "After COVID, it became increasingly difficult to purchase what was needed without a financial burden," she shared.

Thanks to DEPC, they can now provide her granddaughter more learning opportunities to enrich her early childhood development while maintaining a nurturing home environment.


